Your Monthly Update from Earley St Peter's – October 2025



Thought for the month from the Revd Kajsa-Stina Longuère

What do deacons do?

This is a reflection on what it is to be a deacon, with genuine examples of lived in-action experience and constant pondering from your deacon.

OK, I added 'in action' for a bit of drama, but honestly, being a deacon is to be in constant action as it turns out, so it's fully justified.

If you ever run out of things to read, there is always the Ordinal and the liturgy for ordination services. The bit for deacons says that we are called to work with the Bishop (Mary and Steven) and Priest (Kate) as heralds of Christ's kingdom. Fortunately, that means proclaiming the gospel in

word and deed and being an agent of God's purposes of love, rather than wearing medieval bubble-shorts and blowing a trumpet.

We are to serve the community and report back any needs or hopes that the church can act upon (such as the Pop-up Café and Sunshine Social), and we are to work with others to find the poor and weak, sick and lonely, and anyone who is powerless and oppressed, and reach out to the forgotten corners of the world to make God's love visible. It is a pastoral ministry, and very in-action as we help those searching for faith and bring them to baptism, assist in the administration of the sacraments (check out what I do at the high altar during communion), distribute communion, and minister to the sick and housebound. (Do please let me know if you are sick or housebound and want a visit, I'd be delighted to pop by.)

We seek our own nourishment through the Scriptures, that we study with you all so that the whole church is equipped to live out the gospel in the world. We pray faithfully and look out for signs of God's presence as he reveals the Kingdom among us. All of that, and so much more! Basically, deacons are concerned with all the earthy stuff – and God's presence on earth through Jesus Christ. That is one reason for my many hours spent producing the Love Molecule (if you haven't seen it, there is a 3D sculpture of Oxytocin - the Love hormone) between two of the pillars in the north transept.

The Ordinal and the whole idea of deacons is based on the Bible and operations of the early Church. As the disciples worked their way through new lands and their activities grew, they commissioned seven others, including Stephen and Philip, to be disciples in the Diaspora and among the Gentiles. Acts 6:1-6 tells more about this, and though it says that the disciples found themselves too busy to wait on tables and wanted someone else to do it, it is a typical method by which Luke (who probably wrote The Acts of the Apostles) used authority over material possessions as a symbol for spiritual authority. The transfer of spiritual power is symbolised by taking on table service, as Jesus did for the twelve. (I am very happy to serve at tables too obviously, especially if it helps you connect with faith!)

Acts 6:8 onwards through Acts 7 offers a glimpse into the life of Stephen, who did wonders and signs among the people, though not universally loved (obviously I remain hopeful for a better end than poor Stephen's!) Philip in Acts 8:5 preached in Samaria, which gives an idea of how deacons have an evangelical role, and Paul writes to the Romans (16:1)

of Phoebe, a deacon of the church in Cenchreae, who was useful to him and to many. Timothy writes a detailed list of the qualifications of deacons (1 Timothy 3:8-13) – by which I ought not to be double-tongued, drink too much, or be greedy. I ought to be serious, temperate, and faithful, and only marry once, and keep my household and children in good order. Well, I do have a complicated relationship with Timothy. My children are relatively ordered, but the household - and being serious? It's not in the Ordinal!



As it happens, I am very fond of Phoebe, and here's a little icon I wrote. She is one of few women mentioned in Scripture with some form of leadership position, and the only one bearing the title 'deacon' – diakonos in Greek. It doesn't mean that there weren't any other women obviously, it just means that they weren't mentioned –

and there is a long list of reasons as to why that probably was, which can become another article for another newsletter. If you are interested in Biblical women, visible and invisible, Joan Taylor and Helen Bond's Women Remembered: Jesus' Female Disciples (Hodder & Stoughton) is very good.

When I grow up into a 'real vicar' next year, I will still be a deacon for life. All bishops and priests became deacons first, and it isn't something that you graduate from. We care for you and our communities in a very inaction and pastoral way, always.

If you would like to be part of this project, by making coffees, teas, cakes, crafting, and/or socialising, you need to attend both Dementia Friend training, and Foundation safeguarding training (unless you have already done so). More information will be sent out about the safeguarding training, but in the meantime, Revd Kajsa is running a training session on Saturday 11 October at 3 pm in church. If you know of anybody who does not attend Earley St Peter's but who would like to volunteer, they would also be warmly welcome.

Please note that volunteers need to attend a Dementia Friend session and do the safeguarding training before 31 October, in order to volunteer at Sunshine Social on 3 November.

You don't have to sign up to attend a training session, but it would be helpful if you could do so. To sign up to the session on 11 October, click here. You can also sign up by contacting the parish office.

You can also support Sunshine Social with donations. As we aim to make Sunshine Social a cheerful and social space, and run activities, it would be great if anyone have unwanted items to donate (before Kajsa hits the charity shops), including: puzzles suitable for dementia (not

childish ones please), narrow vases for a few flowers to go on tables, magazines (old and new), a game of skittles, and adult colouring books. Please leave in the office, or placed in bags outside the office with Kajsa's name on them.

Welcome Madhuri! We recently welcomed Madhuri Kulkarni and her family to Earley St Peter's. We are delighted that she has now officially joined us as her 'home church' for the duration of her final year of training, meaning Madhuri and her family will be with us regularly until her ordination in July 2026.

- 3 November 2025: I felt very privileged to see a stunning exhibition of huge tapestry panels, entitled *Threads Through the Bible,* at Ely Cathedral in June. They are the work of textile artist Jacqui Parkinson. The whole exhibition consists of 3 sequences: "Threads Through Creation", "Threads Through the Cross" and "Threads Through Revelation". Across a series of huge panels, each 2 – 3m high, the Bible stories are brought to life using fabric, colour and stitches in

a fascinating, creative and thought-provoking way.
